# FLOWERS OF REMEMBRANCE

Flowers have traditionally been laid on graves and memorials in memory of the dead. Rosemary, symbolising remembrance, and has particular significance for Australians, as it is found growing wild on the Gallipoli peninsula . Laurel is also a commemorative symbol; woven into a wreath, it was used by the ancient Romans to crown victors and the brave as a mark of honour. A wreath woven into a circle, represent life and resurrection or teardrop, called a 'chaplet', this shape signifies the tears that are shed in grief.



Since the reign of Queen Victoria in the 1800s, wreaths of flowers have been laid on graves in the United Kingdom and other countries of the British Empire. Since World War I, wreaths have been laid at memorials to remember those Australians who died in service during wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations.

#### Flowers of remembrance

**Poppy** - The Flanders poppy has long been a part of Remembrance Day, the ritual that marks the Armistice of 11 November 1918, and is also increasingly being used as part of Anzac Day observances. During the First World War, red



poppies were among the first plants to spring up in the devastated battlefields of northern France and Belgium. In soldiers' folklore, the vivid red of the poppy came from the blood of their comrades soaking the ground. The sight of poppies on the battlefield at Ypres in 1915 moved Lieutenant

Colonel John McCrae to write the poem In Flanders fields .

**Violets** - Before the poppy became the recognised flower for remembrance, the violet in South Australia, was the 'symbol of perpetual remembrance'. Violet Day was first held in Adelaide on 2 July 1915. Alexandrine Seager, Secretary and Organiser of the Cheer-Up Society, is credited with the creation of the event.



**Cornflowers** - In France, the cornflower, rather than the poppy, became the primary emblem of remembrance as the flower's

delicate blue colouring evoked the colour of the French military uniform.

Throughout World War One soldiers and civilians used native plants and wild flowers to commemorate those who had died and this tradition is again becoming wreaths popular as on ANZAC and Remembrance Day now have the combination of the traditional with Australian natives

#### Laying of a wreath

The suggested procedure for the laying of a wreath is as follows:

- the person moves-up to the memorial with the wreath in the left hand or both hands,
- the person halts, pauses, lowers and then lays the wreath,
- the person adopts the attention position, takes one pace rearwards, pauses and salutes if the person is wearing military uniform and headdress; and
- the person pauses again and then moves away from the memorial.

If the person laying a wreath is not wearing military uniform, the person is to bow their head and pauses to remember after taking one pace rearwards. The is no requirement to place the right hand on the left breast pocket, i.e. over the heart region when a person bows their head and pauses to remember.

#### **Federal Member for Grey**

The decision by the Federal Minister for Infrastructure Catherine King MP to scrap Round Six of the Building Better Regions Fund shows a complete lack of regard for regional voluntary organisations and local governments.

More than twenty organisations across Grey which have spent the time, considerable effort and in some cases thousands of dollars in preparing submissions in good faith.

Applications to Round Six closed in February, meaning that proponents have been waiting for more than eight months to learn the fate of their application. These were processed months ago by the department however, the calling of the election in early April and the subsequent "caretaker mode" prevented the ministerial announcements, we had a change of government and now six months later the new government has thrown all that work in the bin.

I think this is a clear indication of the Government's lack of understanding of regional Australia and is an incredibly disrespectful way to treat regional communities. The BBRF has provided wonderful support for Grey delivering more than \$50m across its length and breadth including most recently, support for the Port Parham Short Stay facility in round five. to upgrade and revitalise the campground.

Regional Australia is the engine room of this nation and this decision by the Minister is a kick in the guts. It reinforces a historic Labor pattern of short-changing country constituents in favour of those living in our cities and raiding regional programs to do so.

It is worth noting that when lats in power at Federal level Labor's last "regional" program included funding to build a ring-route around Perth airport. Minster King has just proudly proclaimed that she has provided funding in "regional" SA for the next stage of City of Holdfast Bay's Jetty Road Masterplan and \$6 million for City of Marion upgrades. She needs to get a roadmap.

While the Budget presents the bare bones of two new regional investment programs, we have no detail and no timelines.

# COALITION OF COASTAL COMMUNITIES

At the October meeting of the Coalition of Coastal Communities the group was addressed by the Acting Chief Ranger of National Parks, April McInerny. A number of community/national park interface issues were discussed including

- Potential for walking/cycling trails through the national park
- Proposals for a horse trail adjacent to the national park (definitely resisted National Parks SA)
- Clear definition of national park boundaries
- Definition of who to contact with issues relating to anti social behaviour in the national park controlled area
- Rumours of "glamping" development
- Thompson Beach north car park (Funding for this has gone missing with the change in state government)

CCC is actively pursuing the relocation of the dump protest statues. When this occurs there will need to significant refurbishing of the statues. If anyone knows of people or organisations who can assist in this please contact us. Primary skills required are metalwork and welding.

A first draft of a proposed web site has been presented and was very favourably received.

A submission to Adelaide Plains Council "Equine Strategy & Background Paper Consultation" has been made on behalf of Coastal Communities.

CCC are concerned at a lack of engagement from the Thompson Beach community. If you are associated with Thompson Beach, are able to effectively communicate with the community and reflect community views, please contact the Thompson Beach Progress Association and/or Coalition of Coastal Communities. Regional Development Australia together with Adelaide Plains Council are promoting a workshop "Use the story of your town to create value and lead change" with Chris Sands, a leader in creating change from the UK. Workshops are expected to be held in Dublin, Two Wells and possibly Mallala in mid November, and CCC will take an active part in these. More details will be publicised when known.

## <u>The Mallala Monument</u> <u>Centenary</u>

On Sunday October 16<sup>th</sup> a moving ceremony was held to mark one hundred years since the official unveiling of the Mallala War Memorial. Most Australian towns have a war memorial or monument. Some are quite simple affairs and others are more elaborate. They become the focus for local residents to gather and remember significant dates such as Anzac Day or Remembrance Day. Many are located in public parks and most are well maintained. The Mallala Monument is no exception.

The weather was perfect on the day and a crowd of several hundred gathered to mark the occasion. Master of Ceremonies, Jim Franks led the service.

Children from Mallala Primary School opened the service with a Welcome to Country followed by the National Anthem.

Elements of the original ceremony held on October 15<sup>th</sup>, 1922, were incorporated into the day's service, including payers and readings.

Financed by public subscription, the monument was officially unveiled on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 1922. The War Memorial consists of a globe with the map of Australia as its base, and around the top are plaques listing the names of those who lost their lives.

The monument was built by public subscription and commemorates ten men who died in service or were killed in action in World War One. Around the top are plaques listing the names of those ten who lost their lives. The ten men are: Sapper Harold Lyle Bartlett Private Samuel Leonard Buttle Driver George Wilfred Cope Private Frank Cullen Trooper Arthur Roy Earl Private Ralph Ashton Lindsay Private William Fred Nairn Private William Fred Nairn Private William Norman Roberts Lance Corporal Walter John Shimmin Private Maurice James Theobald These names also appear on the District of Grace Honour Roll, which is housed in the Mallala Museum. Jim Franks read a short biography of each of

Jim Franks read a short biography of each of the ten men and ten schoolchildren each held a framed photo of each man. Each child stepped forward as the name was read out and placed the photo on the steps of the monument. This was a poignant reminder of the lives of ten young men cut short so tragically, one hundred years ago.



Maxine Varcoe, a direct descendant of George Marshman, Chairman of the District Council of Grace, unveiled a memorial plaque. A floral wreath was then laid at the monument by RSL representative, Leonie Armbruster.


A minute's silence was followed by the Last Post.

Many groups worked together to make the ceremony a success, including the Museum Committee, the RSL, Adelaide Plains Council and Mallala Primary School.

The Mallala Monument was officially unveiled on October 15<sup>th</sup>, 1922 by Lieutenant Colonel Butler. As the Mallala Primary School students played a big role in the original celebrations, it was only fitting that they be involved for the 100 year celebration.

The day started at 12pm with Mr Jim Franks introducing the students. Mollie McArdle then read the Acknowledgement of Country and Traditional Owners. Harvey Griffiths further contributed by reading "Hello earth, Hello sky, Hello me, Hello you. Ninna Marni" while the students performed the actions to these words.

After the official welcome the students then led the singing of the National Anthem.





Mr Franks spoke about each of the ten local men who died in service or were killed in action during World War 1. During Mr Franks' speech, ten students held a framed photo of each of the soldiers and stepped forward while that person was spoken about. The students then carefully laid the photo on the monument.

The ten students felt extremely privileged to be asked to do this very important job and are excited to also now be a part of history.

It was not done to serve the priest Arnott's biscuits if he came knocking. It was either homemade biscuits, cakes from the housewife's oven or Sao's with a slice of tomato and/or cheese. It was still many years before the word cookie supplanted biscuit in the Australian vernacular. One had to be careful of the biscuit and cheese for the Sao could be stale which made a penance of the visit, chewing on the morsel with a forced look of pleasure and politely refusing a second go.

One hot afternoon, the mercury got to over a century. It was my duty as the Priest Assistant to be out doorknocking parishioners who had not been seen at church lately. "Come in Father, how nice to see you. Do take a seat in the lounge and I will get you a cool drink," said the lady of the house. I settled into the plush lounge chair and was enjoying the relative coolness of the house compared with that outside when a voice floated into the lounge room from the kitchen. "Would you like water, tea or orange juice?" "Orange juice please," was my reply and soon after there came a large glass of orange juice with condensation droplets hanging alluringly on the outside. Just what I needed. So, I began to sip the juice as I warily took one of the Sao's. I had never had such pleasant tasting juice before and put it down to the more exalted social standing of the family affording top quality provisions. The kind lady and I began with small talk, and I had soon finished the delicious juice. Then she said she would get me another orange juice and went out into the kitchen. I began to fall asleep and through the post prandial fog came the sound of a nervous laugh and a voice that said, "I am sorry Father, I have given you a can of vodka and orange. My daughter must have brought it home". She then raced into the lounge room to see me in the last stage of falling asleep in the plush chair. Two hours later I woke up much refreshed to the sound of resumed apologies being offered. Then came the offer of a cover up. "I won't tell Father M. (the Parish Priest), I know how hard he is on you young boys". I thanked her for the offer which I readily accepted. When I filled out my time sheet at the end of the week. I noted that because of the importance of the family I stayed longer than permitted, meaning that there was only one visit that afternoon instead of the expected quota of five. I was commended by the Parish Priest for

giving that important family a generous amount of time.

Another parish and another time. I was asked to do some pastoral visiting in the neighbouring parish while the priest took some holidays. It was to some shut-ins who depended on the priest giving them Holy Communion in their home. One of these shut-ins asked me if I would take the church offering envelope from the end of the table near to where we were seated and put it on the plate. I picked it up and put it into the home visiting valise and went to "You left something Father." I looked ao. puzzled. She picked up the bottle of Johnny Walker whiskey and the \$20 note that was also on the end of the table saying, "My mother taught me that you never let the priest leave empty handed if they visited and that the most appropriate gift was a bottle of whiskey and a generous donation." I was not one who drank whiskey up until then but with two more weekly visits to go and subsequently three bottles of whiskey to tempt me I gave it a go. Alas, age and medical issues now mean that alcohol is banned

Yet another parish. It was the day after I was inducted into the parish, being at that stage an eligible bachelor, when a well-dressed and elegant lady came to the Rectory door. "I have come to introduce myself," she said. I invited her in, and we made some small talk as we sat at a very small table that went with the house, for my furniture had not yet arrived. As we talked, I was conscious that instead of being opposite one another we were now on the same side and very close. I moved to the other side and soon we were again side by side. Again, I moved and again, so did the elegant lady. Along with this came more personal talk in a confidential tone. Three times we went round that little table until the elegant lady gave up and huffily said, "I must be off now, I have been here too long as it is".

One of my favourite bible characters is the young man Timothy, St Paul's protégé. When Timothy was just starting out in ordained ministry St Paul gave him these injunctions, "Timothy, you belong to God, so keep away from all evil things. Try your best to please God and to be like him. Be faithful, loving, dependable and gentle". (1 Timothy 6:11b GNB).

# PARHAM & DISTRICT ACTION GROUP (PADAG)



Following significant consideration, the Parham and District Action Group has approved a logo clearly defining our area. It combines a crab with a jinker and our magnificent sunsets. It comes in several forms such as the letterhead form at the top of this report or as a logo suitable for badging as shown here. We thank Lara Apollo for her efforts in designing the logo in consultation with the committee.

PADAG has done a presentation on concept plans for Port Parham precinct development to candidates for the elected members of Adelaide Plains Council. This was carried out by Trevor Applebee on site at the Lions shelter on October 18<sup>th</sup>, and was well received. Originally the intent was to meet with permanent staff of



Council to discuss the concepts and determine potential roadblocks and challenges, but this was disallowed due to the Council holding period pending elections. Once elections are finalised, the meeting with Council staff can be convened.

Members of PADAG have been active in lobbying for organic waste collection in coastal townships including Port Parham and Webb Beach. Several submissions have been made to council over the past 3 years, and PADAG has now written to the Minister for Climate Environment and Water on the issue together with a letter to the editor of the Plains Producer which resulted in a front page article in the edition of 19<sup>th</sup> October 2022. APC candidates have also been lobbied on the issue.

PADAG has sought action from Council to clean up the streets of our communities, in particular the removal of derelict vehicles and furniture. This has had limited success.

Work is progressing on the refurbishment of the Webb Beach Interpretative centre, although continuing wet weather is slowing progress.

Similarly wet weather is slowing progress on the refurbishment of the Parham Camp Ground and it is unlikely to be opened to the public before the end of November.

A committee has been formed to organise the Port Parham New Years Gala Day for Sunday January 1<sup>st</sup> 2023 so **IT IS ON AGAIN!**

#### Covid-19 vaccine information & updates

- **Covid positive result?** Mandatory isolation requirements for people who test positive to COVID-19 in South Australia has been removed, effective from 12.01am Friday 14 October 2022. It is strongly recommended that the community stay home if they test positive to COVID-19 until their symptoms resolve (usually 5 to 7 days) & to take additional precautions, including mask wearing, if they must leave their home.
- COVID vaccination **should be delayed by 3 months after a COVID-19 infection**, in accordance with ATAGI advice. A three-month gap between infection & vaccination is likely to lead to a better immune response & result in longer protection from reinfection. In special circumstances a vaccine can be administered earlier in high-risk circumstances, per ATAGI guidance.
- Positive RAT? You must <u>report</u> a positive rapid antigen test result within 24 hours which can be done here - <u>South Australian Government - Reporting your rapid</u> antigen test result (forms.sa.gov.au)
- The Department of Health & Aged Care have been notified of a phone scam that is targeting members of the Australian public. These scam calls appear to come from one of their hotline numbers – 02 6289 1555. They do not make outgoing calls from this number & are not responsible for these calls. (We haven't been informed of when delivery of 'funded' (ie 'free') vaccines will be delivered as yet. <u>National Immunisation Program Schedule | Australian</u> <u>Government Department of Health and Aged Care</u>)</u>

#### Appointment types – GPMP / TCA

If you or a family member has a chronic medical condition, you / they may be eligible for services of either a <u>General</u> <u>Practitioner Management Plan</u> & or <u>Team Care Arrangement</u>. Chronic medical conditions are those that have been, or are likely to be, present for at least 6 months. These care plans help you to co-ordinate care & reduce the need for ad hoc consultations. They're useful for recording comprehensive, accurate & up-to-date information about a patient's condition & treatment.

Developing a care plan can also help encourage a person to take responsibility for their care & they may be able to identify things they could do to achieve the goals of the treatment. Please speak to your doctor about this.



## The Mallala Monument

Most Australian towns have a war memorial or monument. Some are quite simple affairs and others are more elaborate. They become the focus for local residents to gather and remember significant dates such as Anzac Day or Remembrance Day. Many are located in public parks and most are well maintained. The Mallala Monument is no exception.

Financed by public subscription, it was officially unveiled on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 1922. The War Memorial commemorates ten men who died in service or were killed in action in World War One. It consists of a globe with the map of Australia as its base, and around the top are plaques listing the names of those who lost their lives.




The memorial was unveiled on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 1922 by Lieutenant-Colonel Butler

The Adelaide Register on 17th October, 1922 recorded the event:

"Ten gallant men from the Mallala district gave their lives during the war. To their memory a monument has been erected at the junction of roads in the centre of Mallala. The bottom of the edifice is dome shaped, 42 feet in circumference, on which has been reproduced the map of Australia. This sphere rests on a circular step, below which are two wider steps of Victorian bluestone. The lowermost step is 60 feet in circumference. The super structure is 10 sided: and consists of a die with plinth, standing on a step above the sphere, all of which, including sphere and step below, is of Sydney freestone. The head of the die is encircled by a band of aluminium, with a panel on each of the 10 sides, each panel giving the name and details of a deceased below. Above the die is a structure of Angaston marble, consisting of a pink marble body, with 10 ornamental columns, each having 10 flutes, with entablature and sloping roof above, having a four-sided cross at the head, with 10 anethemions at the eaves. All except the pink body is in white marble.

The design and supervision were placed in

the hands of Frank H. Counsell, F.S.A.I.A., who arranged a contract with Mr. W. Laycock, while Messrs. Brown Brothers made and fixed the aluminium nameplates. These contracts amounted to about £1,325. In addition to this amount the estimated work of the committee given voluntarily — was about £350. On Sunday last the monument was unveiled by Lieut-Col. Butler, D.S.O."

This year the Mallala Monument turns 100. It was financed by public subscription and was officially unveiled on 15<sup>th</sup> October, 1922. These names also appear on the District of Grace Honour Roll, pictured above, which is housed in the Mallala Museum.

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The statement of receipts and expenditure for the construction of the monument

The unique design of the monument means it has been featured in several books and is included on websites such as Monument Australia. It is also listed on the State Heritage Register. It is regularly photographed and is well maintained by the local Council. Roses are now planted around the base.

In 1922, when the monument was constructed and positioned, Mallala was a farming community with little motorised traffic. Who could have foreseen that decades later this would change considerably and this intersection where eight roads meet is now a busy thoroughfare.

There have been numerous times over the vears where heated debate has ensued about the suggestion of relocating the monument. In particular, in 1999, it was proposed as part of a redesign of the intersection to address road safety issues, that the monument be repositioned. There was opposition to this idea from many groups and individuals, most notably the RSL, who stated, "The members believe it should be afforded the same protection as any other sacred site which it certainly is for the district of Mallala and the ex-service community at large." Local farmers also expressed concern that large farming vehicles would

have trouble negotiating a proposed roundabout at the site.



The monument today

A petition against the relocation of the monument was signed by hundreds of local residents and presented to Council. A road safety audit was conducted by the State Government of the time, which resulted in minor changes to the intersection.

So today, one hundred years after its official opening, the Mallala Monument still commands pride of place in the centre of the town and hopefully, will still be standing in the same position, another hundred years from now.




