Remains of the Government well in Dublin

South Australian Weekly Chronicle Saturday 7 March 1885, page 21

DUBLIN. February 28.

Our Government well-boring party in charge of Mr. Otto Sampson have succeeded in giving us a splendid supply of water, and I can say that without doubt it is one of the finest stock wells in the colony. They had the steam pump at work without a stoppage for 48 hours, and the supply did not diminish in the least. Mr. O. Sampson, who has charge of the party, and Mr. C. Anthoney, the engineer, with the rest of the party, have made themselves very much liked in the district by their genial manner, and I am sure that when they leave this township they will take with them the good wishes of everyone. The splendid supply of water will make Dublin the favorite route for stock travelling to and from the north instead of Mallala, which up till now has been the route.

QUEEN ELIZABETH THE SECOND, AN EXCEPTIONAL MONARCH 21 APRIL 1926 - 8 SEPTEMBER 2022

The level of emotion raised by the passing of Queen Elizabeth II has surprised many, not just here in Australia, but across the Commonwealth and to countries beyond, as people have paused to reflect on her life and contribution to the fast-moving world in which we live.

Through changes of governments, conflicts, natural disasters and huge economic challenges, the Queen has remained concerned, informed, compassionate committed and that in itself is remarkable. That she was able to keep the level of intensity for more than seven decades across two centuries is even more so. That incredible commitment to constituency right across Commonwealth is unlikely to ever be equalled.

Most of us alive today (anyone under about the age of seventy-five) cannot remember a world without Queen Elizabeth.

She visited Australia on 16 occasions and came to South Australia seven times. However, she was renowned for taking an interest outside the capital cities and on a number of occasions between 1954 to 2002 she visited Woomera, Port Lincoln and Whyalla (twice) all in the electorate of Grey. Many will have personal memories of those occasions.

Elizabeth II was loved and respected by the global community and our affection for her continued to grow as her reign progressed.

The Queen reigned across seven decades and her tours to Australia forged a bond which has survived throughout that time.

We wish her family all the best as they deal with their personal grief and extend good wishes to King Charles III.

CCC has commenced consideration of a route for a coastal walk trail from Port Gawler to Port Parham. It has been determined that the Northern Landscape Board is actively investigating a similar concept following the completion of the "Walk the York" trail, and there is a need to develop a dialogue between CCC and the Northern Landscape Board on this.

A subcommittee has been established to develop a Web presence for the CCC.

LESSONS IN LIFE AND LIVING

I well recall the lesson I learned about what happens when you leave a vehicle in motion. It was like this. I was about 12 years old. My younger brother and I were in the back of an A4 Austin utility being driven by the manager of the grazing property checking on the windmills and water troughs. In the tray with us were three of our cousins. Being all boys there was a high degree of rivalry as to who would jump out to open and close the gates from one paddock to the next. The first gate was approached at speed for the manager had a reputation in the area as one who only drove two speeds. Flat out or dead stop. I was determined to beat my older cousin as the opener of the first gate. Just before we screamed to a halt I leaped out, not expecting the velocity to continue. I landed on my feet, immediately toppled over, and tumbled a few times along the ground alongside the ute. Thankfully my tumbling was parallel to the vehicle, and I did not roll under the wheels. Covered in dust, feeling sore in many places, and suppressing the urge to vomit I stood up and opened the gate, waited until the vehicle went through and after closing it, I hopped painfully back into the tray. My older cousin had a wide grin on his face and announced he had tricked me as he had no intention of leaping out of the ute until it had stopped. This was a lesson for me on jumping out of things that move. I now know you leave a moving vehicle by hitting the ground running in the direction of travel.

Another lesson in life years later was when I was in theological college. It was my last year and my sponsoring bishop had made me a deacon just before college started that year because he had a shortage of clergy with many vacant parishes, so he fast tracked the ordination process by making his students deacons in their penultimate year of study instead of the end of that year, being able to ordain them as priests instead at the end of the year we finished our studies. As the only student on campus wearing a clerical collar, I found that the many of the students looked up to me for help and guidance. A group of them came to see me about some students and their visiting friends who flouted the college rule of no alcohol on the campus by having a

drunken party in one of the rooms. "What would I do about this?" was their question to me. I was now out of my depth because I was not in any authority there even if they thought so, but I was ready to try. (Jump out of the moving ute again so to speak). My reaction was to say that I would take their issue to the Warden who was the priest in charge of the college. The Warden listened to me and said that he would take the matter further if I went to each of those students who were at the party and told them the Warden wanted to see them about the matter. This I did but with great fear and trepidation for I knew that they and their friends would not treat me well as the bearer of such news despite my clerical collar. From the Warden's point of view, he was hearing of the incident from me second hand, and I had to prove my sincerity. The one thing I learnt out of it all so early in my ministry was that I was not to be the one who fixed other people's problems. A better response to the complainants would have been to offer to go with them to the Warden as moral support so they could tell their own story firsthand. My ministry was to be an enabler not a fixer. This lesson too has stood me in good stead in my ministry as a priest.

Sometimes our actions will lead to tears, pain, and consequences, no matter how well intentioned we are. We cannot go back in time but what we can do is bring the past forward by remembering our mistakes and failures so that they are not a recurring theme.

St Paul put it this way in a sporting metaphor, "I have not yet reached my goal, I am not perfect. But Christ has taken hold on me. So, I keep on running and struggling to take hold of the prize. My friends, I don't feel that I have already arrived. But I forget what is behind, and I struggle for what is ahead. I run towards the goal, so that I can win the prize of being called to heaven. This is the prize that God offers because of what Christ Jesus has done. All of us who are mature should think in this same way." (Philippians 3.12-14 CEV)

PARHAM AND DISTRICT ACTION GROUP (PADAG)

The committee of PADAG continues to be active in many areas but since the report in the last edition of Dublin Dispatch there have not been a lot of "completions" to add.

Work is well progressed on the Webb Beach interpretation centre with the walls replaced and the signs reinstalled. It is a much more presentable facility now. The commemoration plaque will now be ordered and replaced.

A concept plan has been developed for the Parham Precinct and is waiting for consultation with Adelaide Plains Council staff before it can be progressed further. Residents and visitors will have noticed that shade has now been constructed over the playground by Council.

Adelaide Plains Council convened a workshop of about 50 interested person regarding horse float parking at Port Parham on 16th August. Council presented 2 options for float parking:

- The current temporary site in MainStreet
- A possible alternative in East Terrace near the Interpretative centre

Of these 2 options there was overwhelming support for

continuing at the current site, however the question was raised of using a site on North Parham Road which was submitted to a similar workshop in 2015. There was strong support from both local residents and equine interests for the use of this site, and Council

has been asked to review the study considering this option. The meeting was attended by Councillors Terry-Anne Keen and John Lush, who noted the interest shown.

The workshop also considered a proposal to establish a horse and walking trail along the levee from East terrace to the southern end of the Esplanade. There was very little support for this proposal from either residents or the equine interests.

As reported elsewhere in The Dublin Dispatch, work is proceeding on the Parham Camp Ground, with the ground being closed for the months of September and October, with camping fees to apply when it reopens.

It has been observed that surveying work has been carried out on The Esplanade and it is understood that Council now has engineering reports and costings re the potential sealing of The esplanade

Wattleseed, the Acacia, was a mainstay in the diet of Australia's earliest inhabitants for thousands of years providing a rich source of protein and carbohydrate in times of drought. The seed was crushed into flour between flat grinding stones and cooked into cakes or damper. Even the green seeds of some species were eaten after baking in the hot coals.

Wattleseed contains potassium, calcium, iron and zinc in fairly high concentrations. With a low glycemic index, they are good for diabetics, providing a steady stream of sugars that do not produce sudden rises in blood glucose levels. Most vitamins are found except for C, B12 and riboflavin. they are high in fibre – over 30%.

The Mallala Monument

PART THREE

This year the Mallala Monument turns 100. It was financed by public subscription and was officially unveiled on 15th October, 1922. A community event is planned for Sunday October, 16th the to mark occasion. The War Memorial commemorates ten men who died in service or were killed in action in World War One. It consists of a globe with the map of Australia as its base, and around the top are plaques listing the names of those young men who paid the ultimate sacrifice.

The ten men whose names appear on the monument are: Sapper Harold Lyle Bartlett, Private Samuel Leonard Buttle, Driver George Wilfred Cope, Private Frank Cullen, Trooper Arthur Roy Earl, Private Ralph Ashton Lindsay, Private William Fred Nairn, Private William Norman Roberts, Lance Corporal Walter John Shimmin, and Private Maurice James Theobald.

These names also appear on the District of Grace Honour Roll which is housed in the Mallala Museum. Who were these men? Let's get to know some of them a bit better:

Private William Fred Nairn (3563)

William (Fred) was born in Grace Plains on 4th August, 1897. His parents James and Emma nee Riseborough were farmers. The eldest of seven children, he had three sisters and four brothers. They attended the Grace Plains School. Fred left when he was fourteen to work on the family farm.

On August 24th, 1915, having just turned 18, he enlisted in Adelaide. He was 5 ft 9 34 inches tall with brown hair, a fair complexion, and hazel eyes.

He had previously served eighteen months in the Senior Cadets. He embarked on the *HMAT Borda* with the 27th Battalion, mostly made up of South

Australians bound for training in Egypt. In late February of 1916, he was transferred from the 27th Battalion to the 10th Battalion in Zeitoun, Egypt. He then travelled to Serapeum and on to Alexandria. From there he was sent to Marseille, France for active duty in the Somme region.



Fred was reported missing in action in France on the 19th of August, 1916. He had been captured in the Battle of Pozieres and was later reported as a Prisoner of War in Germany in October. However, he had been wounded in the left thigh during the action. The wound was severe and had hit an artery causing him to be weak through loss of blood. The wound remained untreated. A decision was made to amoutate his leg. For several days he seemed to be improving but he sank steadily. The cause of death was given as sepsis and cardiac weakness. He died of his wounds on the 21st of September in the Prisoner of War hospital, Res Laz.

He was buried in Grafenwohr, Germany. In 1924, his remains were

exhumed and reinterred the in Niederzwehren British Military Cemetery at Cassell, Germany. His personal effects being a wristlet watch & strap, wallet, 25 foreign coins, a pencil, cigarette holder, one 10 mark note, four 2 mark notes and one 1 mark note, a mosquito net, safety razor in case, swimming costume, two scarves, handkerchiefs, pair of mittens, two brushes and two notebooks were returned on board the Themistocles. He was awarded the Victory Medal and the British war Medal.

Private Maurice James Theobald (4863) was born on the 21st January 1895 in Nairne.

His mother was Maria, nee Bottroff and his father Thomas Theobald was a Methodist Minister. This no doubt explained why the family moved to so many different locations. Younger siblings, Russell and Dulcie were born in Laura. George was born in Port Lincoln. Later they also lived at Meadows, Snowtown, Black Forest and Mallala.



They attended Yongala School from April, 1910. Maurice was discharged from school at the age of fifteen in August of the same year. On the 27th January, 1917 he joined up at Mitcham. At this time, he was 22 years and one month old and employed as a bank clerk. He stood five feet eight and a quarter inches tall with fair hair and blue eyes.

He embarked from Adelaide on board the "Borda" in June, 1917 and arrived in Plymouth in August. After training, he was sent from Southampton to Le Havre to join the 43rd Battalion. He was admitted to a field hospital suffering from scabies twice in February of 1918. In May he was deprived of two days' pay for the crime of being absent from Tattoo. He was admitted to hospital again in June suffering from laryngitis. He was killed in action in France on 26th August, 1918. He was 23. He was buried in the field. He was later exhumed and buried in Suzanne French Military Cemetery, seven miles North West of Peronne.

His personal effects in one parcel containing a wallet, religious book, name plate, photos and letters were sent on board the "Barambah".

He was awarded the British War Medal, Victory Medal and the 1914/15 Star.

A photograph of his grave was transmitted to his next of kin by the War Office.

Private William Norman Roberts (4756) was born in Barabba on the 21st October, 1892. His parents were William Stephenson Roberts and Elizabeth Mary, nee Rafferty.

He enlisted on the 24th January, 1916 at the age of 23 years and 3 months. He gave his occupation as farm labourer. He stood five feet six and half inches tall. He had a fresh complexion with blue eyes and brown hair. He was initially appointed to B Company 2nd Depot Battalion with the rank of Private. After initial training at Mitcham he was assigned to the 27th Battalion. He departed the Exhibition Camp on the 16th February, 1916.

On 30th April, he suffered from a mild case of measles and was admitted to hospital. By 14th May he became dangerously ill with fever. He died of cerebro spinal meningitis on 5th June at the Government Hospital, Suez.

He was buried there and later exhumed and re interred at the Suez Christian Military Cemetery, Suez.




His personal effects consisting of a knife, cup, handkerchiefs, steel mirror, two keys, a comb, identity disc, two small books, a notebook and testament were returned on the "Ulysses", to his parents in Barabba.

He was awarded the 1914/15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory Medal.

Next edition we will get to know the last two names on the Monument.

Vaccine information & Covid 19 updates

Covid 19 positive result? Some people who have tested positive are eligible for antiviral medication. This is the link with information about who is eligible. Updated Eligibility for oral COVID-19 treatments | Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care. A prescription will need to be issued by your doctor to access the medication.

There are some people who <u>should not</u> take the anti-viral medication.

Winter booster - From 11 July, people aged 30+can access a fourth dose of the COVID-19 vaccine **The recommended interval between the third dose, or a recent** COVID-19 infection, and the fourth dose is three months.

COVID-19 vaccination should be delayed by 3 months after a COVID-19 infection, in accordance with ATAGI advice. A three-month gap between infection and vaccination is likely to lead to a better immune response and result in longer protection from reinfection. In special circumstances a vaccine can be administered earlier in high-risk circumstances, as per ATAGI guidance.

Positive RAT. You must report a positive rapid antigen test result within 24 hours which can be done here - South Australian Government - Reporting your rapid antigen test result (forms.sa.gov.au)

Your doctor will be able to view digital imaging, via Bensons' program, which "allows referring practitioners to access their patient's images and reports online as soon as an examination is complete (in most cases)"

We will still receive the report electronically.



Dublin Water Well

Extracts from TROVE and the Book - "Dublin Yesterday and today":

28/2/1885 - Dublin water well opened

18/3/1885 - **Dublin Water Supply**.

A deputation, consisting of the members for the district of Yatala, Messrs. W. Gilbert and J. H. Bagster, and Messrs. Tench and West, waited on the Commissioner of Crown Lands on Wednesday to ask that the necessary apparatus for raising water at the Dublin tube well should be erected without delay. It was suggested that a Halliday windmill and elevated tanks would be extremely convenient, as by this means the residents would be able to get a good supply of water without delay in the case of a water famine. The Conservator of Water, who was present at the request of the Commissioner, pointed out that there was a possibility of a windmill being brought to a standstill when most wanted, and said he would recommend that a McComas water lifter should be erected. The well had proved to be a very great success, and as the water was of good quality he had no doubt there would be a great deal of it used.

BAROSSA WATER SUPPLY

At the Dublin institute on Saturday evening a meeting was held for the purpose of discussing the water supply question. The chair was occupied by the chairman of the Dublin District Council (Mr. L. White), who convened the meeting in response to a requisition. Mr. E. H. Coombe, M .P., was present, and contributed information as to the conditions which the Government had laid down in connection with the reticulation of the district with water from Barossa. A plan was also exhibited by Mr. Coombe, showing the contemplated routes for mains in the district. One main would go to Shannon from Mallala, but up to the present Dublin was excluded. A number of questions having been answered by Mr. Coombe, Mr. W. Prime proposed That the Government be requested to arrange for this district to be reticulated with water from Barossa. Mr. G. Long seconded the motion, which was lost by 15 votes to 11. Reference was made to the fact that several persons were present from Wild Horse Plains, who were opposed to the water going through there, although they did not wish to prevent the Dublin people from obtaining it. It was suggested by Mr. Coombe that if those in the neighborhood of Dublin desired to have the water they could probably secure it by obtaining the signatures of owners and occupiers of land, between Dublin and Mallala, and petition forms were taken for that purpose.

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

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
