LONG PLAINS MEMORIAL HALL

LONG PLAINS HALL. MEMORIAL TO SOLDIERS.

The war memorial for Long Plains and district has taken the form of a public hall. Plans and specifications were prepared by Messrs. Rogers and Jefferies and it was unanimously agreed to do the work by day labor. As the work proceeded the committee were able to make alterations deemed necessary. The building by day labor cost about £150 less than the lowest tender received. The cost of the building approximated £1,500, exclusive of stone and sand, and all carting, which were provided by voluntary labor. A debt of about £200 remains. A committee of ladies worked splendidly, and raised about £250 with which they have handsomely furnished the hall. The

opening celebrations were begun on Sunday, October 21, when a commemoration service was held, and despite the unpleasant weather, a record gathering resulted. The service was led by the president of the committee, Mr. A. K. Parker, assisted by Pastor Taylor and Mr. H. Clark. M M Brigadier-General S. Price Weir D.S.O., V.D., unveiled a beautiful marble honor roll, and the photographs of four fallen soldiers. The singing was led by a combined choir, Mrs. C. W. Burnard acting as pianist. An offering on behalf of the Bedford Park Home for (soldiers realised £8 8/. The official opening took place on Monday, October 22, the proceedings beginning with the 'Song of Australia,' by a children's choir representative of most of the schools, in the district and led by Mr. M. J. Standley.. 'Lady Butler delivered an address to the' children, after which little Miss Joan Parker presented her .with a lovely bouquet of roses grown by Mr. S. D. White, of Windsor.

Sir Richard Butler, who has represented this district in Parliament for 33 years, at the request of the president, then officially opened the front doors of the hall by removing an inscribed ribbon. Visitors quickly filled the building, and the proceedings began with the National Anthem. The president extended a hearty welcome to all present, and expressed his gratification and that of the committee at the happy and successful issue of what had

proved a rather formidable undertaking. Brief statements -were presented by the treasurer (Mr. D. J. Daniel) and the secretary, special mention being made of the fine work put in by Mr. A. E. Duck (mason) and Messrs, C. H. and S. J. Baker (carpenter and painter, respectively).

Congratulations were offered and good wishes were extended in brief speeches by Sir R. Butler, Messrs. H. B. Crosby, M.P., A.W. Robinson, M.P., Jas. McLachlan, M.P., Colonel O. P. Butler, Mr. Manly (chairman of the Balaklava District Council), and Mr. A. Marshman (chairman Grace Plains District Council).

A comprehensive vote of thanks, proposed by Mr. F. D. Parker and seconded by Mr. M. J. Standley was carried by acclamation.

High tea was served at 4.30, and was followed by a much-enjoyed concert, the programme for which was supplied by the Mallala Glee Club, assisted by Mr. Percy Carle, of Adelaide. During the interval the King competition was decided, -when the king of sports (Mr. C. H. Baker) was crowned. The proceeds of the day amounted to about £450, A supper and dance followed.

Consultation now open on the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan Discussion Paper

The State Planning Commission (the Commission) has released the Discussion Paper for the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan and want to hear from community, councils and industry on how we prepare for future growth.

Engagement is open to everyone. Feedback will inform the draft Greater Adelaide Regional Plan which replaces the 30-Year Plan for Greater Adelaide.

The Discussion Paper is an evidence-based document with a strong focus on what the Greater Adelaide Region may look like in 2051. It presents key considerations and trends that we need to consider in our future planning.

Projections show Greater Adelaide's population could grow by up to 670,000 people over the next 30 years. Bold decisions are required to strengthen the sustainability, liveability and prosperity of the Region.

There is an opportunity to provide early input into the Greater Adelaide Regional Plan and help determine:

- what Greater Adelaide might look like in 30 years
- the needs and wants of current and future communities
- where and how we should grow.

The Paper is open for 12 weeks of public consultation from 14 August 2023 to 6 November 2023, 5:00 pm.

During the consultation period, a series of information sessions have been planned.

Oct 14 will be the day when we decide whether to fundamentally change our Constitution by permanently inserting a new chapter establishing an Indigenous Voice to Parliament.

The proposal is not as Mr Albanese would have us believe, a modest change. It undermines the principals of equality, that every vote has the same value; it does not target need or disadvantage, instead providing special rights to one racial group and it is permanent, even if it becomes unworkable and infiltrated by those with radical agendas.

The Prime Minister has provided scant detail on how the Voice would work in practice, how it would be appointed, who would be eligible, which is hardly surprising given the increasing trend of self-identification led to a 25.2% rise in people claiming Indigeneity last census. How the multitude of regional clans and family groups could ever agree on one or two people to represent them is given no consideration.

He says the Voice's powers will be limited, but because the proposal includes the ability to question executive government the limitations on power will be decided by the High Court, not the Parliament. The only thing clear is about the Voice is that nothing is clear!

Mr Albanese now says it is a moderate change, simply "good manners" and subservient to Parliament which is in stark contrast to his earlier statements that "It would be a very brave Parliament indeed that would defy its wishes." His hand-picked ambassadors like Megan Davis, Thomas Mayo and Marcia Langton agree, speaking of an authoritative body empowered by the Constitution to negotiate terms of treaty and reparations.

The assumption behind the question that somehow governments operate in a vacuum making indigenous policy without consulting them, is ridiculous. There are thousands of aboriginal corporations with the Coalition of Peaks representing the 80 most powerful, more than 30 very influential Land Councils and the PM's Indigenous Advisory Council. They hold the power now and will continue to do so under the Voice. The idea that somehow, they are holding back on brilliant solutions that will miraculously come to the fore when we have a Voice, is absurd.

At best the Voice will change little apart from adding to the budget for superfluous organisations. At worst it will ham-string multiple government decisions and require indigenous permission to do just about anything in Australia.

That's why I'm voting No.

OPENING OF AVON SUNDAY SCHOOL HALL

The stormy, cold weather of Sunday and Monday last did not prevent large crowds from gathering at Avon to take part in the opening services in connection with the new Sunday School Hall.

The Sunday School and Church services were started in the State School over eight years ago by the Northern Conference of the Churches of Christ, and were continued until about eighteen months ago, when the Department said the school could be no longer used. There being no other building available, the Sunday School was closed and services discontinued,

A number of the residents, however, determined to overcome the difficulty, and a meeting was called to consider the erection of a hall of their own. The following were appointed as a Building Committee: M. G. Rundle (Chairman), E. Carter (Secretary and Treasurer), A. Parker, E. A. Parker, T. Pym, J. Carslake, and S. Duck.

They immediately set to work, and interviewed the residents, securing the sum of £360. This was thought sufficient to commence building operations, and Messrs. B. Porter and C. H. Baker were engaged as builders. They, with Mr. S. Baker as painter, rendered most excellent service, and have received many congratulations on their splendid workmanship.

The hall is of limestone, and is 40 ' feet x 25 feet, solidly built, high and lofty in appearance. It is splendidly finished inside and out; contains a large platform, and is well seated with chairs, while the Wizard Petrol light has given every satisfaction.

The opening ceremony was conducted by Mr. Wm. L. Ewers, minister of Balaklava Church of Christ (who was largely instrumental in organizing the Sunday School). The Chairman of the Committee (Mr. M. G. Rundle), presided over the opening service. and brief congratulatory addresses were given by Messrs. P.H. Roediger (President Northern Conference), H. M. Tuck, and E. V. Hollams (the first Superintendent of the school). Two items by the Male, Quartette Party were much appreciated. Mr. W. L. Ewers gave an address on "Wise Investment."

The night meeting was conducted by Mr. Rundle, and was largely attended.

On Monday the opening tea and public meeting was held and over 200 braved the elements. Mr. W. J. Taylor (minister Church of Christ, Long Plains) occupied the chair. The Treasurer's statement gave the total cost of the hall as £644, of which £360 had been contributed, leaving £284 outstanding. The chairman made an earnest appeal, which resulted in a most liberal response, about £120 being given in cash and promises.

Solos by Mrs. Stanley and Mrs. Taylor, and brief addresses by Messrs. Manley, Tuck, Hollams, and Ewers added to the enjoyment of the meeting.

So liberally had the good ladies provided for the tea that there was more than sufficient for an ample supper. Mrs. E. Carter, Mrs. A. Parker and Mrs. T. Pym had charge of the tables.

OPENING OF BOWMANS TO ADELAIDE RAILWAY.

[Notes by ".Traveller."]

Residents of the Peninsula towns are delighted at the change in the time table that was instituted on Monday, May28th, when the old custom of travelling via Hamley Bridge was changed to the new route from Bowmans via Long Plains to Salisbury. For nearly half a century the schedule has prevailed, and on Monday, for the first occasion, travellers were able to reach the city in time for dinner. The journey from the Peninsula towns to the city is one of the most tedious in the State, particularly the slow and monotonous ride through the Hummocks and over the swampy country adjacent. The stop at Port Wakefield,


where it is necessary to reverse the order of the train, means a stay of 20 minutes, and the hope is general that in the near future the old order of things will be changed here also, and a. faster run secured that will further lessen the journey by at least an hour. It is quite likely many travellers . will motor to a site on the new railway to Snowtown and link up with the broad gauge to Adelaide, avoiding slow through the run Hummocks to Wakefield.

On the day of the opening the train contained "many who had undertaken the. journey previous occasions and on arrival at Bowmans there was some excitement over the new order of things, so the stentorian voice of the railway officials, "change here Adelaide 1", was most for welcome. .The station at Bowmans provided with up-to-date facilities for the break of gauge, and a 200 yards platform provides ample room for the long trains that will convey the passengers 'from the Peninsula and North. A flourishing little township is in the making "at Bowmans. .The new railway cottages are nearing completion, and doubtless in a few months what was formerly an outback scrub siding will become a busy township. A large number of boys from Prince Alfred and St. Peters colleges were returning after the holidays, and the first ride on the new railway proved novel' to them, and. will rank in their memories as a notable event.

The train arrived to schedule time at Bowmans, about 10 a.m., but there was little to show that the new railway was being opened. The local school mistress and a number of children did, however, appear on the scene and greeted the passengers with flags bearing the word "Welcome." (Guard W. Crighton, well known and popular on the system, was in charge, end was heartily congratulated. On the train leaving the station the scholars gave hearty cheers, which were joined in by the few residents and railway officials who had assembled

on the platform. On board the train were some well known farmers who were doing the trip, and the country passed through was greatly admired.

A halt occurred just before reaching Kallora, • where the up Peninsula train was waiting, and our train was back shunted on to a siding, to allow the other train to pass. The new station is a small structure surrounded by numerous canvas tents, where navvies are camped completing earthworks. Greetings passed between the passengers of the trains to and from the Peninsula, A .number.. of 'railway officials were 6ri board the train bound for Bowmans, doubtless the passengers would be treated to some speeches at that place. Avon was the next station, and children from a distant school were mustered to give the passengers a greeting as the train passed through.

The arrival at Long Plains was quiet. Evidences of progress were noticed, and a fine, new hail is In course of erection.

The query was raised why the opening of the railway was so quiet, but there was no adequate explanation. Here again the school children did not forget to give the new train a greeting, and the college boys replied with a fusillade of cheers. Some very promising crops are seen near Long Plains, and at Calomba evidences or the recent fine rains were also manifest. Some of last season's wheat remains at the siding.

The thriving township of Mallala was next reached. All the residents were out, and did not forget to give us a cheer. Korunye is the next siding, and the farmers were all too busy seeding to trouble about the Peninsula passengers doing their first trip. There was" little of note from Two Wells to Salisbury, and the-journey thence to Adelaide was of ordinary interest. Passengers expressed themselves pleased with the alteration and the saving of an hour, and it is hoped the day is not far distant when the broad gauge will be extended to the Peninsula.

LESSONS IN LIFE AND LIVING

I well recall the lesson I learned about what happens when you leave a vehicle in motion. It was like this. I was about 12 years old. My younger brother and I were in the back of an A4 Austin utility being driven by the manager of the grazing property checking on the windmills and water troughs. In the tray with us were three of our cousins. Being all boys there was a high degree of rivalry as to who would jump out to open and close the gates from one paddock to the next. The first gate was approached at speed for the manager had a reputation in the area as one who only drove two speeds. Flat out or dead stop. I was determined to beat my older cousin as the opener of the first gate. Just before we screamed to a halt I leaped out, not expecting the velocity to continue. I landed on my feet, immediately toppled over, and tumbled a few times along the ground alongside the ute. Thankfully my tumbling was parallel to the vehicle, and I did not roll under the wheels. Covered in dust, feeling sore in many places, and suppressing the urge to vomit I stood up and opened the gate, waited until the vehicle went through and after closing it, I hopped painfully back into the tray. My older cousin had a wide grin on his face and announced he had tricked me as he had no intention of leaping out of the ute until it had stopped. This was a lesson for me on jumping out of things that move. I now know you leave a moving vehicle by hitting the ground running in the direction of travel.

Another lesson in life years later was when I was in theological college. It was my last year and my sponsoring bishop had made me a deacon just before college started that year because he had a shortage of clergy with many vacant parishes, so he fast tracked the ordination process by making his students deacons in their penultimate year of study instead of the end of that year, being able to ordain them as priests instead at the end of the year we finished our studies. As the only student on campus wearing a clerical collar, I found that the many of the students looked up to me for help and guidance. A group of them came to see me about some students and their visiting friends who flouted the college rule of no alcohol on the cam-

pus by having a drunken party in one of the rooms. "What would I do about this?" was their question to me. I was now out of my depth because I was not in any authority there even if they thought so, but I was ready to try. (Jump out of the moving ute again so to speak). My reaction was to say that I would take their issue to the Warden who was the priest in charge of the college. The Warden listened to me and said that he would take the matter further if I went to each of those students who were at the party and told them the Warden wanted to see them about the matter. This I did but with great fear and trepidation for I knew that they and their friends would not treat me well as the bearer of such news despite my clerical collar. From the Warden's point of view, he was hearing of the incident from me second hand, and I had to prove my sincerity. The one thing I learnt out of it all so early in my ministry was that I was not to be the one who fixed other people's problems. A better response to the complainants would have been to offer to go with them to the Warden as moral support so they could tell their own story firsthand. My ministry was to be an enabler not a fixer. This lesson too has stood me in good stead in my ministry as a priest.

Sometimes our actions will lead to tears, pain, and consequences, no matter how well intentioned we are. We cannot go back in time but what we can do is bring the past forward by remembering our mistakes and failures so that they are not a recurring theme.

St Paul put it this way in a sporting metaphor, "I have not yet reached my goal, I am not perfect. But Christ has taken hold on me. So, I keep on running and struggling to take hold of the prize. My friends, I don't feel that I have already arrived. But I forget what is behind, and I struggle for what is ahead. I run towards the goal, so that I can win the prize of being called to heaven. This is the prize that God offers because of what Christ Jesus has done. All of us who are mature should think in this same way." (Philippians 3.12-14 CEV)
