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LOCAL PROTESTS

THE TAXATION QUESTION - 1886

A representative meeting was held in institute hall, Wild Horse Plains, last night to consider the question of taxation. Mr. A. Barr remarked that there were a number of agitators in the city 'endeavouring to sway the Government and get a heavier land tax imposed, and if the



country people did not speak out now they might have burdens laid on them which they were unable to carry.

PROTEST ON BOMBING - 1954

More than 1,000 people have signed a petition protesting against the use at weekends of beaches below Port Wakefield as gunnery and bombing ranges.

Beaches involved are in the area from Sandy Point below Port Wakefield to Port Prime—a distance of more than 30 miles. The petitions have been sent to Tanunda, Angaston, Gawler, Yorke Peninsula, Owen, Mallala, Two Wells, and Adelaide suburbs. Messrs. W. S. Manley and O. Pym, of Avon, and Mr. H. D. Henstridge. of Balaklava, have organised the



petitions. Mr Henstridge said: "The district has already made representations to the Federal Government. Now we're going to try again. This time we expect to be backed by at least 5,000 names."



Celebrating Councillor Keen and Councillor Strudwicke's 20 years of service

The 20-year commitment of Adelaide Plains Council's Deputy Mayor Marcus Strudwicke Councillor Terry-Anne Keen and was celebrated Local Government at the Association South Australia's April Ordinary General Meeting. Councillor Keen began her service in November 1998, as a Ward Councillor for Dublin in what was then the District Council of Mallala. One of the most memorable moments for Councillor Keen has been the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on Council, "Council remained open and deliver continued to services to the community, leading by example. The council staff and elected members adapted smoothly without fuss and continued to function as a unit." When asked for the Council's greatest achievement she has seen during her service, Councillor Keen said "Council is experiencing unprecedented growth at the moment. Managing the growth to enhance the lives of our residents and ratepayers, I believe is an achievement Council continues to deliver by." Councillor Strudwicke commenced his service in May 2000, with his most memorable experience being the Pinery fire in 2015. "I was acting Mayor due to the resignation of the [previous] Mayor, and Council was also without a CEO. As the community rebuilt, so did the Council, and with a newly appointed

CEO, the renamed Adelaide Plains Council emerged." Councillor Strudwicke said. "The modernising of the Council through development of policies, asset management planning and long-term financial strategies has been the most noticeable change over the past two decades," said Councillor Strudwicke of the Council's greatest achievement made during his service so far. "This has put us in a strong position to manage the considerable growth in the region," he said. For two councillors to commit themselves to the service of their community for over 20 years is a great achievement. Being an elected member of a council is not an easy task with many challenges, however there are many accomplishments. highlights and The ratepayers have chosen to re-elect Councillor Keen and Councillor Strudwicke repeatedly over the years which indicates a level of satisfaction and confidence in them to represent the community. Our Goal

Establish a project vision, guiding principles, and scope of the required community and civic facilities through a series of investigations, workshops, and community engagement.

Key Facts

* Adelaide Plains Council commissioned an independent third party to review Council's current community and civic facilities, to understand their suitability to meet the needs of our fast-changing population. The report received and endorsed on 27 June 2022 identified a critical need to improve the efficiency, functionality, and space availability of our community and civic facilities.

* The key recommendation we received was to undertake a "Community and Civic Hub Investigation" to establish a project vision, guiding principles and scope.

* This investigation does not represent a commitment to proceed with developing a Community and Civic Hub in the immediate future.

* The information we learn now will inform the next phase of planning for our future. There will be many more opportunities to provide your ideas and feedback as our research and planning progresses.

Project Background

Being one of the fastest growing local government areas in South Australia brings a change in expectations of how we deliver services, what facilities we provide, and how we accommodate more residents, visitors, and staff.

In recognition of this growth, we commissioned an independent third party, Holmes Dyer, to review our current community and civic facilities so we can understand their suitability to meet the needs of our fast-changing population. The report received and endorsed on 27 June 2022 identified a critical need to improve the efficiency, functionality, and available space to meet the expectations of a rapidly growing population. It was determined that our current facilities would not accommodate the needs of the future community.

The report's key recommendation was to undertake a "Community and Civic Hub Investigation" to establish a project vision, guiding principles and scope of required community and civic facilities. Coordinated by Holmes Dyer, we are hosting a series of investigations, workshops, and community engagement.

Consultation findings and research will create the basis for recommended facility requirements, locations, delivery models, configuration needs, budgeting, risk analysis, project brief, cost estimates, governance and procurement planning as part of the next phase of investigations.

These investigations do not represent a commitment by Council to proceed with developing a Community and Civic Hub in the immediate future. Rather, they provide the necessary basis for us to make an informed decision about the delivery of such facilities in the future.

As part of the first phase of investigation, a Communication and Engagement Plan was produced to guide the consultation program and help maximise the feedback from the various engagement activities. This plan was endorsed by Council on 27 March 2022 and details different engagement and consultation methods that will happen during the first phase of this investigation.

Unwind on the Samphire Coast: Parham Campground Reopens!



Nestled in the northern section of the Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary - Winaityinaityi Pangkara sits the quiet Parham Campground. With only a short stroll across the sand dune to reach the ocean's edge, it is the perfect location to unwind and soak in the scenery, or a enjoy a weekend raking for blue swimmer crabs. The Campground, originally operated solely by Adelaide Plains Council, reopened on 2 April 2023 and is now operated by the Mallala & Districts Lions Club. Mr Brenton Bell, President of the Mallala & Districts Lion Club, announced the campground "received over 90 bookings before opening day and quickly booked out for the Easter long weekend," at the Opening Celebration held on Saturday 1 April 2023. With a \$100,000 Federal Government grant under the Building Better Regions Fund, and a further \$100,000 commitment by Council, the site now boasts a modern toilet block, coin-operated hot-water shower, RV dump point and a new BBQ shelter and picnic facilities. The effort to complete the project and reopen to visitors has been a great cooperation between both the community and the Council, and our region has something to be very proud of. Bookings cost \$15 per night for one of 27 unpowered sites, and \$20 per night for one of the 6 powered sites. "The Campground will also bring money into Parham and Dublin. Visitors staying here will visit the Port Parham Sports & Social Club for dinner, and buy their

groceries and petrol in Dublin," said Mr Bell. Mallala & Districts Lion Club are further supported by Parham & District Action Group. The campground is only a 25-minute drive from the centre of Two Wells, or 40 minutes from Gawler.



W FOR WABBIT.

Phonics was one of the ways I was taught to read. The Little Room, called that because in the two-teacher school in which I started my education the lady teacher taught years one to three. All pupils in the NSW Education system then began their school career at the age of six and went straight into first class. Almost none of the pupils went to High School which was thirtyfive miles away over unmade roads in a time when only those with money had a car and their children were away in boarding schools in Sydney or Melbourne. However, there was a middle range income to which my family belonged. They could afford fees for the school hostels in Hay NSW where the pupils resided in term times. There were two hostels for girls and one that accommodated both girls and boys. These hostels were established by churches, one by the Anglicans, Riverina House and established by the Diocese of Riverina, with up to twenty girls, one by the Methodists, Butterworth Hostel started with assets from a local philanthropic business family, with about the same number of girls, and the coeducational one, Claughton House run by the Presbyterians which was started with the bequest of money and a mansion bequeathed to them if they started a hostel for country schoolchildren in Hay. In 1950 it had sixty-five boys and ten girls in residence. The total of about 115 pupils meant that the number of pupils from the hostels in the Hay War Memorial High School was greater than those who came from the town. Hay was the only matriculation High School in Western NSW between Wagga Wagga and Broken Hill, so the hostels were always full of the children of hopeful bush parents. The demarcation line between the hostel townies and the children was exacerbated by all hostels discouraging their boarders from making friends with the town children and would not allow them to visit. There was a high school uniform of white shirts, dark brown trousers or tunics for girls, blazers, jumpers, and hats with a yellow hat band with a dark brown tie. School Captains and Prefects had their blazers trimmed with yellow ribbon. It was a dull sight to see the school pupils enmasse and they knew it. It seemed to engender among them a feeling of unworthiness and depression. I write this as an outsider for the boys in Claughton House wore the Hostel uniform and not the High School one. It was white shirt, dark blue blazer, grey trousers, a

wide blue satin tie and grey felt hat. We shone as diamonds when at school amid the sea of drab brown and this made us feel free. The girls in Claughton House and the two girls' hostels wore the dark brow rig.

But I am ahead of myself. Let me take you back to the Little Room in the Carrathool NSW public school. Every day we had to recite from the alphabet phonics chart. It was made up of twenty-six squares and in each square was a coloured illustration of an object together with its With her stick, which was a initial letter. regulation cane for disciplining the naughty, the teacher would point to each letter in turn with a menacing flourish, and we would recite the letter as spoken, A for Apple, B for Bat, C for Cat, D for Dog and so on until we arrived at Zed for Zebra. No one explained that phonetically it may have been written K or C for Cat, not to mention J and G. We just went with the flow of the older pupils who in turn were following the years ahead of them. There was one bright spot though, every day to which we looked forward with great anticipation. Colin spoke with an inability to phonetically pronounce the letter R. Yes, when we arrived at R for Rabbit, we would always lower our voices a little and Colin could be heard above the crowd. W for Wabbit! The teacher would scowl and pretend that it did not happen and move on quickly as we hissed S for Snake, until we arrived at X for Christmas. No one ever explained what that X was all about, and no pupil ever asked. I learnt what that was all about when I started to go to church regularly late in my teens and heard a sermon in Advent as we were leading up to Christmas. We were exhorted to never replace the word Christ with an X for that would be close to blasphemy and against the Ten Commandments.

My era was one that was built on good children rewarded and naughty children punished with adults as judge, jury, and executioner. Any objections based on fairness or supposed innocence or even correctness increased the punishment. In dealing with adults, children could never win as it was not a level playing field. We had to resort to more subtle wins that came along like W for Wabbit.

The bible text applied to us children may well have been, "Even from birth the wicked go astray; from the womb they go astray...." (NRSV).

The Parham Camp Ground was officially reopened for business at an informal get together on Saturday April 1st 2023 after a 6 month closure for upgrade works. A barbeque was held in the new camp kitchen facility with volunteers and those previously involved in the camp ground development and operation over the past 30 years invited to attend.

The campground has entered a new phase of operation with management being taken over by a Parham Camp Ground Committee consisting of representatives of the Parham and District Action Group and the Mallala and Districts Lions Club. Campers are now required to pay a camping fee with bookings and payment being made on line.

At the get together, Brenton Bell of Mallala Lions outlined the process for getting to this

Mallala Museum New Transport Gallery – History Month

May is History Month in South Australia, giving small and large museums alike the opportunity to showcase local collections and events. This year the Mallala Museum is pleased to present the completion of their newest gallery the "Transport Gallery". Much work and planning has gone into the completion of the new display.

Transport is vital to small towns and communities in rural areas. In the early days, when the first white settlers arrived with all their wordly goods in horse drawn wagons and children rode horses to school. With the arrival of the motor car, schools, became churches and businesses more centralised. Then came the war years where a vital RAAF base was located near the town. Today, the sound of racing car engines creates a backdrop to the noise of farm machinery. The new transport gallery features the stories, events and methods of transportation used by the people of the Mallala district.



Displays in the new gallery tell the story of transport in the local area from the early days when horses were the main form of transport to more recent times when the town has become synonymous with the Motorsport Park.

Some of the items featured in the new gallery include the Hooded Abbot Buggy. The Buggy was owned by the Pratt family of Korunye (formerly known as Paddy's Bridge). John Pratt was an 'Old Colonist' who had arrived in the Lower Light area c. 1860 to purchase land. His grandson William Pratt and his wife Margaret (nee Frost) are well remembered driving to the Lower Light Methodist Church for Sunday Services and other local activities. William Pratt used the buggy regularly, and one important event was the monthly trip to Gawler to procure a supply of bran for his pigs and ducks. The buggy continued to be used by William almost up until the time of his death in 1956. The buggy has a forward-facing seat for two or three people. During wet weather the hood could be fully closed on three sides. On a mild day the middle back could be rolled up, and on a very hot day the sides could be removed, or the hood completely lowered. The timber wheels had solid rubber rims. The wheels were dish shaped and set so they are angled away from the vehicle at the top, to enable centrifugal force to throw dust and mud away from the passengers, who were also covered with a waterproof, wool lined lap rug to keep them clean and warm. A light horse or pony was used for the purpose of pulling the buggy. A nosebag of chaff was always on board for the sustenance of the horse when they reached their destination. A lamp was set in a bracket on each side. A sloping back compartment with hinged flap could be opened up to store luggage or goods. The buggy was donated to the Mallala Museum by Mr Ernest Pratt of Korunye, the son of William and Margaret Pratt. It was in poor condition and in 1999 was restored by Dennis Nation and John Dickson (both of Mallala) assisted by members and friends of the Museum Committee.

The large German wagon was brought to the area by the Konzag family and was used in general farming as well as to carry goods to market. The timber wagon has adjustable sloping sides and was pulled by two horses.

During the Second World War a large RAAF base was established just North of the township where pilots were trained for active duty. After the War, air shows were held at the facility. These were very popular and drew large crowds from Adelaide. These continued up until the 1970s. The Museum has significant displays relating to the RAAF base.

A Penny Farthing bicycle has been restored and is now displayed in the new gallery. The bicycle was purchased by Samuel Temby for use by the family. His son, Harold Temby, became adept at riding the bicycle and was regularly seen riding along Temby Road to Middle Beach. This was probably only a dirt track at the time. Years later, Harold moved to live in a cottage on the corner of Aerodrome Road

and Joseph Street, Mallala and he rode the bicycle at times around the town. Harold purchased a conventional two wheeler and the Penny Farthing was confined to the back shed where it gathered dust for many years.

In 1950, a relative persuaded Harold to sell him the bicycle and so Lance Tiller became the proud owner. Many months were spent in practicing his skills on the Penny Farthing until he felt confident to apply to participate in the John Martins Christmas Pageant held in Adelaide each year. Thus began Lance's long association with the pageant. He rode the bicycle, which was brightly painted and decorated with colourful streamers, in the pageant, for 40 consecutive years.

Lance Tiller offered the bicycle to the Mallala Museum - the district in which it was first ridden. It was restored to its original colour of black and minor repairs were completed.

The Mallala Motorsport Park was established at the site of the RAAF base. New interpretive panels tell the story of the raceway.

An official open day will also be held on Sunday 28th May with special guests and the public invited to join with the Museum Committee and the community in an official opening of the new gallery. The event starts at 2pm and afternoon tea will be provided. Entry is free on the day. Please advise Anne Sawtell at Adelaide Plains Council if you would like to attend. the Advertiser and Register, Both but principally the Register, had spoken in favor of an increased land tax. Farmers must therefore take a decided stand at once. He moved-" That this meeting strongly protests against any attempt being made to increase the land tax at the present time, as the harvest returns have been so poor and the value of wheat has so depreciated that the farmer is unable to sustain further taxation." Mr. D. Wilson seconded. He said a certain class would like to see all the money required to meet the deficiency of the colony levied from the country districts. He sympathised with true distress, but thought the condition of the unemployed had been exaggerated. A few people in Adelaide were trying to rule the colony, Mr. D. J. Strongman supported, and in doing so said much of the land was already too highly taxed. It was the farmers who had given it any value which it might have by dint of perseverance and hard work. He had no hesitation in saying many of them had not earned anything like 4s. 6d. per day, besides having had to put up with long hours and in conveniences which working men in town knew nothing at all about. The land tax was draining the country, and if increased would drive farmers out of the colony. Mr. James Strongman thought the district councils should take up the matter and stoutly resist the proposal to increase the burden on the land. A unanimous vote was taken in favor of the propositions.

Dublin Ratepayers Protest - 1931

DUBLIN, Today.

Cr. A. D. Prime (chairman of Dublin District Council) presided at a public meeting of ratepayers in the local institute. Protests were voiced against the district rate and. land tax assessments. Speakers urged a reduction in the district rate to 1/ in £1.

As the rate had been recently reduced from 1/5 to 1/3, however, a vote of confidence in the council was subsequently carried unanimously.

Discussion of land tax assessment followed. It was decided to protest against the valuations in view of greatly decrease land values and to urge a reduction of 50 per cent. on former assessments. It was further resolved that the Commissioners of Taxation be asked to accept 50 per cent. on the condition that the balance should be allowed to remain in abeyance without incurring fine or interest.

It was also decided to lodge a complaint

against a proposed increase in water rates, and, to advocate a reduction.


