The Dublin Dispatch Story

The Dublin Community Club first introduced a newsletter in 1991 to keep the residents informed on local issues and events. The last published newsletter was March 2003

In November 2003, local Dublin resident Karen Irving, considered that it was important to keep residents informed of local news, the publication of "Dublin Downunder" began, Karen charged 20 cents for each monthly edition. Unfortunately, in April 2004 due to changing circumstances she ceased production of the newsletter.

In June 2004 Pat Thompson suggested the Dublin History Group Inc, start to produce a newsletter, this was agreed to but it would be produced bi-monthly and other guidelines were applied.

The first issue was September - November 2004, with Pat editing it and voluntary groups, clubs, churches, sporting bodies, services and local council and parliamentarians all contributing. Margaret Tiller, a member of the group suggested the name "Dublin Dispatch".

The District Council of Mallala agreed to print and collate the newsletter for a cost, it then moved to Grandeur Press in Balaklava for printing but over time and changing circumstance, our MP's have assisted in its publication - Nick Champion MP, Senator Alex Gallacher, Fraser Ellis MP and now Penny Pratt MP.

Bendigo Bank has been sponsoring the Newsletter since the second issue in 2004.

Over the years there have been other sponsors - Livestock Market Limited, Grandeur Press, BTR Excavations Pty Ltd, Lower Light Hotel and Sharmans.

Some contributors have been there from the beginning and regularly add there stories to the content and new ones are always welcome.

Our advertisers have been very loyal as well and assist in keeping it a free publication and support the Dublin History Group's projects.

The Dispatch has been distributed over the years through different outlets. It is posted to advertisers and those with subscriptions and complimentary ones.

When started it was put together with printed pages and pictures and adverts stuck on with sticky tape. Now it is all electronic apart from the pick up and distribution of the paper version.

In March 2016 the Dublin Dispatch had a few changes, Andrea Brow would bring it together and it became a live, "On-Line" document which you could read online and link to advertisers and contributor's websites and emails and seen in colour. This then enabled the newsletter to be distributed via email to interested readers

The 2023 issue was printed in colour for the first time, a lovely surprise for all.

Over the past 20 years of the Dublin Dispatch, an archive has been created with this and other local newsletters we have collected, a wonderful research tool and reference to local information and events.

Adelaide Plains Council adopts 2024/2025 budget

The 2024/2025 Annual Business Plan and Budget was adopted at Adelaide Plains Council's 5 August Special Council Meeting. The budget focuses on achieving a balance between meeting the needs of a rapidly growing population and the increased costs faced by Council and ratepayers due to costs of living and inflation.

Council's total operating revenue for the financial year will be \$18.617 million, with \$14.946 million from rates and \$3.671 million from other sources, including grants.

Council adopted an equal average general rates increase of 5.5% to all land use categories, which equates to an average general rates increase of 5.07% across the council, inclusive of 3.74% growth in number of rateable properties.

This year the Council Members have chosen an austere approach to the budget. The comparatively low increase in rates and heavy reduction to employee costs does have a flow on effect, namely impacts to service levels, some critical, and response times may be noticeable to the general public.

Budgeted expenditure of \$18.589 million focuses on operating expenses and \$4.815 million on capital works that support the region's enviable lifestyle, emerging economy and remarkable landscapes.

Key elements of the 2024/2025 capital works program include:

- \$4.245 million in asset renewals, covering 39km of road re-sheeting and 13km of road resealing, including roads in Korunye and Dublin.
- \$570,000 in new or upgraded assets.

New projects to look forward to include; a local business support program and community partnership funding, in addition to continued work towards the Two Wells Town Centre. Following community feedback, changes were made to the budget to find cost savings. These include the removal of some changes proposed operating projects. street tree planting and reduction of employee costs. Tough financial times affect everyone and Councillors are acutely aware of this. The budget has been carefully scrutinised, options explored and detailed consideration given over months to achieve a reasonable budget. With a growing community, the expectations of services and amenities from Council is changing and we are adapting to those needs. Modern councils need to be agile and respond to changes in a changing world.



The Coalition of Coastal Communities has decided to go into abeyance pending the response from the Adelaide Plains Council on various issues. There is little point in meeting regularly when there is no action that CCC can take. CCC will meet when decisions are required on issues or a need has arisen to lobby local or state government organisations on matters impacting our communities.

Currently there are two major activities requiring Adelaide Plains Council action.

Refurbishment and relocation of the Wakefield Highway protest statues:

CCC has been active in relocating the statues to a safe location, thus preventing them from being disposed of as scrap metal. Proposals have been presented to Council on potential locations for these to be placed for permanent display, and any further action is awaiting Council response. Once locations are firmed up there will need to be community consultation on the placement, and then action can be taken to restore the statues, and place them whist meeting the requirements of the statue originator and owner.

Salt Creek Remediation at Middle Beach

Volunteers have been working with APC on this since 2013. Recently a subcommittee was established to progress the activity, and is waiting on the Council to take the lead on this project. There will be the need for appropriate grants plus environmental issues to be dealt with (Considerable work has been done by the volunteers on the environmental aspects).

CCC is also watching closely a Council project to review the Coastal Adaptation Study carried out several years ago and will provide input when this review is commenced. The previous study recommended that significant levee banks be installed in coastal settlements destroying much natural flora and the amenity

of the coastal settlements. This has been strongly resisted by residents and there is considerable scientific evidence that such levees are unnecessary.

The Coalition of Coastal Communities was established in early 2020. Its intent was defined in this statement: "The Coalition of Coastal Communities will look at strategies for managing tourism and rate payer interests along the coast of the Adelaide Plains Council and as necessary focus on specific targets"

Since then the CCC has achieved the following

- Developed a strategy document for the coastal communities and presented this to the Adelaide Plains Council, and promoted it within the communities and with Regional Development Australia Barossa Gawler Light Adelaide Plains.
- Developed a constitution and became an incorporated body
- Developed communication methods including a web site, unique email address, and face book presence
- for the Lobbied sealing of the esplanades at Port Parham and Thompson Beach, and Webb Beach Road. Designs and costings for this activity have been completed and are now "shovel ready" pending suitable funding coming available.
- Saved the Wakefield Highway protest statues from being scrapped, and commenced negotiations for refurbishment and relocation
- Sponsored a "meet the Pollies" event at the Dublin Cricket Club where both Federal and State Politicians were present and available to meet with residents.

CCC have also attempted the following with limited success

- Determining appropriate branding for the coast to be used to promote the area. Our proposals that the coast be named "The Shorebird Coast" were well accepted by Regional Development but were not supported by the elected body of the Adelaide Plains Council
- Establish a campground in the South Parklands in Dublin. After 2 years of effort with the advice of Adelaide Plains Council staff, CCC were advised that this

could not proceed because of a lien on the proposed location precluding its use for this purpose. No other suitable location has been identified. This is somewhat frustrating as it would have created a boost for local traders and the community, and would have managed the illegal camping.

- Lobbying to establish a suitable sea level monitor in St Vincent Gulf to monitor variations in sea level, providing additional firm scientific information for Coastal Adaptation Studies. This was well supported by Adelaide Plains Council, but required the support of other Councils with shores on the Gulf, and this support was difficult to obtain.
- Establishing a "coastal walk" along the coast. This has been frustrated by several issues including National Park access, suitable crossings for coastal estuaries etc. This has been a

consideration by the Adelaide Plains Council in preparing community plans (currently in draft form) but recent reports that the "Walk The Yorke" initiative has not been particularly successful has caused such proposals to be put on the backburner

The Coalition intends to meet when appropriate responses are received from Council or when important issues arise consistent with the intent of the CCC as defined above.

Recently the Parham and District Action Group (PADAG) carried out a working bee at the Parham Campground. Over the 15 months since the opening of the campground there has arisen a need for focussed maintenance activity including thorough cleaning of the facilities, restoration of fencing, weed control and management of flora growth. 7 volunteers did a great job on the day. Reports from visitors continue to be excellent, although minor vandalism is frustrating both to campers and volunteers.

A subcommittee with representatives from PADAG and The Dublin History Group are continuing with planning for the 150th anniversary of, Dublin, Port Parham and Windsor in 2026.

Work is continuing on establishing a Neighbourhood/Rural Watch group in the area. A number of people have completed applications for police clearances so that they can take responsible positions in the neighbourhood watch structure. Recent events in the local communities rural properties

indicate the need to establish this structure as soon as possible.

Planning and design work is continuing on the proposed precinct development at Port Parham. Adelaide Plains Council commissioned a consultant to develop plans based on PADAG's concept for the area, and these were presented to the August meeting. These are quite impressive and we are looking forward to costings and project staging proposals so that ultimately a programme of works and funding proposals (including sources of grants) can be developed.

At the August meeting, PADAG also focussed on "bring a guest" and a number of people attended and found out what PADAG was about and the objectives for the future.

A resident has brought to attention illegal dumping east of Driscoll Terrace. This area was cleaned up only a couple of years ago, and has now returned to a similar condition. PADAG is investigating options for another
