






Church Service Windsor Uniting Church

The Dublin History Group Inc. members were finally able to present their Churches and Chapels event and displays last weekend. It was to be part of the SA History Festival in May but with COVID – 19 concerns, the event was put it on hold. We decided to move forward as restrictions eased, so on Sunday 2nd August in conjunction with the Windsor Uniting Church, we coordinated a display at the Church Service. This Windsor Uniting Church has the distinction of being the only church we were researching that has had continual worship since it's opening in 1873 and the only Methodist Church to become a Uniting Church in 1977. All others had closed and some had already been pulled down by that time. So, in this lovely 147-year-old church, Reverend Collin Heslop lead us in a wonderful service and touched upon the closing of the local churches over the years and the variety of reasons that contributed to it. After the service we enjoyed a morning tea, looking at the display and sharing the memories it invoked.





