First World War: Repatriation of Veterans

When troops returned from the First World War (WW1) and disembarked at docks across Australia, they carried the effects of their experiences in this terrible and destructive war. New technology in warfare led to shocking injuries and many of those who returned suffered the physical and mental effects.

The Australian Government established a war pension scheme in late 1914 to help wounded veterans and the families of those who were killed. However, the growing number of casualties prompted the need for a new, comprehensive and centralised repatriation scheme.



In 1918, the Australian Government created the Repatriation Department to help returned veterans resettle in the Australian community. The department introduced programs to assist veterans develop their vocational skills and find jobs, and supported their independence through pensions and loans. A soldier settlement scheme was established and administered by the states.

The department also provided medical services to meet the extensive and varied needs of veterans and financial assistance for their dependants. It was an enormous undertaking for the Repatriation Department, which had no model to work from. The long-term costs of ongoing medical care and welfare benefits following the war were on a scale never before encountered.

The Dublin Repatriation Minute Book that was donated to the DHG was dated from 26/6/21919 to 9/11/1921, it is a combination of General and Executive Meetings these were held either in Dublin or Windsor. The Chairperson at the time was H W Lyons, the committee consisted of Misters G. Price, H A Lyons, Taylor, W Brook, Ross and J Bingham, Miss Day and Madams - Price, Prime, Arnold, White, Sunman and C Lindsay (Secretary).

It discusses how they supported the returned solders with accommodation, employment and substances, paid doctors fees, as well as allowances for soldiers settling on the land for stock and implements. If there were any issues the ex-soldiers had with the State body they would help to get resolution.

Also fundraising by concerts and sports days and supporting the Peace Loans the Government had issued.

The fallen soldiers widows would receive Christmas Gifts from the state body.

W H Lyon and C Lindsay attended Repatriation Conferences in Adelaide and one in June 1919 Mr Lyon was quoted as saying

"There had been much dissatisfaction with the manner in which the State Department had dealt with land settlement, but they realised that it had had great difficulties. Many people were anxious to get on the land and some would be quite as anxious to get off again. It was just as well some delay had occurred. He gave the Commonwealth credit for what it had done for repatriation."

Algal bloom Information

Report dead or dying wildlife

Do not touch or remove dead or dying wildlife you find on the coast. You can report sick or dead wildlife to the Algal Bloom Hotline by calling 1800 774 779.

Seafood and crabbing

All commercially available seafood from South Australian waters is safe to eat. Shellfish available for sale is frequently tested to make sure it meets strict safety standards.

If you catch fish, crabs, prawns, lobsters, or squid yourself, they are safe to eat if cleaned thoroughly and gutted before cooking.

But:

Bivalve molluscs (oysters, cockles, mussels, pipis, scallops) and abalone that you catch or collect yourself should not be consumed.

Never eat dead fish, cockles or other marine

life found on the beach.

Swimming in or touching the water

SA Health advises to avoid contact with discoloured water or foam.

The algae does not product a toxin that is harmful to humans or could cause long-term effects, but exposure can cause:

skin irritation

eve irritation

respiratory symptoms such as coughing and shortness of breath.

focus on what they do best: growing, creating, and providing for the nation.



Protecting Our Shorebirds: Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary

Saturday, 11 October marked World Migratory Bird Day. It was a chance to meet up with the Friends of the Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary (FAIBS) and a time to celebrate the incredible journeys of millions of shorebirds that travel vast distances each year — from the Russian tundra and Alaska all the way to our own Port Parham and Thompson Beach.

The Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary or Winaityinaityi Pangkara, means "country belonging ton all birds" in Kaurna language because around 27,000 migratory birds find refuge each year.

Stretching 60 kilometres from Barker Inlet to Port Parham, this pristine coastline is home to 263 species of flora and fauna, including the curlew sandpiper, red knot, ruddy turnstone, and eastern curlew.

The dedicated 'Friends' volunteer group formed in 2016 to protect the sanctuary by monitoring plants and shorebirds, raising awareness about the importance of the habitat and organising events to engage the community.

These volunteers have helped the sanctuary thrive for nearly a decade and they would welcome more volunteers. I have learned a lot about this sanctuary by spending time with the volunteers and I admire their efforts to conserve this area as many of them travel from the city.

On multiple occasions now I have raised my concerns in Parliament about the impact of harmful algal bloom on Gulf St Vincent's marine life. This coastal crisis threatens the very food stock migratory birds rely on, from molluscs and worms to small fish.

Make no mistake, the algal bloom is having an impact on the ecosystem and our migratory shorebirds. I have used parliament, talkback radio, algal bloom community sessions and social media to get answers from the Labor State Government in response to concerns shared by FAIBS, BirdLife Australia and local park rangers. We must ensure there is adequate funding to protect the feeding habitat for these remarkable birds.

Safeguarding this sanctuary means preserving a vital link in a global migration flyway and protecting one of our region's true natural treasures. It is well worth a trip to Thompson Beach. Just remember to 'tread carefully' and give the birds 'room in the bloom' to feed peacefully.

GREAT UNCLE HARRY, A GALLIPOLI VETERAN

Harry was a family member that one only heard about as my Great Aunts talked to each other when they thought no one was listening. Like most adults, especially those brought up in late Victorian and early Edwardian eras they failed to notice the presence of children. Now adults and especially older ones are fascinating beings for children when they are two generations away like as my great aunts were from me, and the subjects of their private immensely conversations are interesting. Children learn to hide in plain sight, so thankfully family stories are passed on, albeit unwittingly.

Great Uncle Harry never featured in the flesh to me despite being one of my forbears who I thought I knew well through listening in. Later when I became an adult and did family history research, I was able to use what I had learnt by listening to recognise the gaps in my knowledge of Harry and so complete the tragic tale.

Harry was an Anzac who landed on Gallipoli as part of the Australian 4th Light Horse (dismounted). There was no room for horses on the narrow beaches of Gallipoli. The attrition rate for human casualties was so severe and the need was for troops on the ground in great numbers so that the Light Horse was sent, dismounted.

Harry was invalided off the Gallipoli Beach and transferred after hospitalisation to a Camel Unit in Egypt after spending some time in a military hospital on Malta and again on Cyprus and in Egypt. No one had any idea how to treat his illness. He was not alone in this as no matter how hard the army doctors tried, they could not seem to get to the bottom of his illness. Many medicos gave up on him and of hundreds of others like him who did not respond to conventional treatment, so doctors brought the treatment to a close by blaming the patient for wilfully malingering. Thus, Harry

was given up as a bad job and was invalided home to Australia with the diagnosis of "neurasthenia," or in plain English, "nerves." The public called it "shell shock." When he arrived home, he found that his wife had taken on a lover and he was no longer wanted, losing permanent contact not only with his wife but his children also. He went back home to his parents for a time, but his father found it difficult to cope with him in close quarters and especially when he would not follow the fatherly advice to "Pull yourself together man." The unwritten assumption was that it was all Harry's fault that he had frequent episodes of dysfunctional behaviour. His mother and his adult sisters were more clement in giving him the benefit of the doubt but in those days in well run households the oldest male member ruled over the rest and Harry lost and eventually left home when ordered by his father to go and never come back. His mother and his sisters were ordered to never contact him or speak his name though one sister did by secret letters for some time.

He went to Queensland, as far as he could go and for some years was in and out of hospitals as a war veteran, but no one could make a difference to his irrational episodes. Each time he was hospitalised the doctor tried the latest treatment to no avail and in the end, he was out in western Queensland taking the spa waters at the newly established mineral hot water baths at a place called Muckadilla. This was all the rage among those that could afford it or like Harry at the army Repatriation Department expense. Muckadilla proved as useless as all the other attempted cures and on returning to Brisbane he boarded with a widow and her two daughters. With their sympathetic care Harry gradually became more functional, and his manic episodes lessened in severity and frequency until at last he could hold down a job and eventually

married one of the daughters and gradually remade a happy life never leaving Queensland and losing all contact with his family, though never out of the memories of his mother and sisters.

The truth was that Harry had PTSD, which we only now are beginning to understand, and we still seek a complete cure. When we are faced with not being able to help people it is easier to blame the victim in the end for their disability which for us brings the matter to a close and absolves us from guilt and responsibility.

I am writing this article on Good Friday and cannot help but be thankful that Jesus does not give up on us and our failures as we try to follow his example of love. It is a temptation to say that it was alright for him as he was God, yet life would be unbearable if we all followed this cop-out. We are faced with the example through history of so many who like him loved others to the end.

MOTORSPORT IS COMING HOME

From 1941 to 1960, RAAF base Mallala was home to a number of units, notably No. 6 Service Flying Training School featuring Airspeed Oxfords, Avro Ansons, CAC Wirraway and P51's.

Come the 1960's, as RAAF operations moved to nearby Edinburgh, the facility was transformed into a motor racing circuit with the taxi ways and runways forming the basis of the track. This new circuit opened in 1961, hosting the Australian Grand Prix together with Sports Cars, Touring Cars even V8 Supercars right through until the turn of the century.

For the past 10-15 years, Mallala has been a shadow of its former glory under the shadow of events and facilities like the Adelaide 500 and The Bend. 'Homecoming' is our way of reinvigorating the circuit, showcasing aspects of its past while setting it up for the next chapter of its existence.

The event is a two-day **National Championship race meeting** – the first event of its kind at Mallala for more than a decade. It will run over November 21st and 22nd - Fri-Sat with track activity until 9:30pm each night, incorporating an air show aspect to the event throughout the Saturday with static and aerobatic displays spliced in between racing. Given the success of Aldinga and Barossa Air shows, they anticipate a crowd in excess of 10,000 people with food stalls, camping and displays.

The Annual General Meeting of PADAG was held on 9th September

This was the first AGM of the organisation after becoming an incorporated body and was relatively well attended. The meeting was chaired by Kym Bailey and presentations were done on the current status of the campground, 150 Year Anniversary celebrations and the foreshore precinct development as well as PADAG achievements for the past 12 months. We were pleased to welcome Tony Piccolo MP and Councillor Brian Parker to the meeting

We were disappointed to learn at the meeting that the community proposal to move the 80Kph zone to include the Port Parham Road/Webb Beach Road intersection had been rejected by the Department of Infrastructure and Planning. Following discussion proposing that PADAG write to the Minister in protest, Tony Piccolo MP offered to take the matter up and was successful in getting the decision changed. Members of PADAG, the Adelaide Plains Council, and Mr Piccolo were able to celebrate this with a photo opportunity on 9th October. This was the result of over 5 years of submissions and follow up to the Council and DIT.

A submission from PADAG to provide a RV park at the south end of Dublin on Council managed land was presented to Adelaide Plains Council at their August meeting. There was no resolution from this meeting.

PADAG approached Council to have the sea wrack accumulated on the Port Parham Foreshore during the May and June storms removed. Council was quick to action this but have been slow to react to sea wrack accumulation at the boat ramp since. PADAG restored the bollards in the car park which were impacted by the storm.



A working bee at the camp ground in August involving about 12 community members resulted in the removal of a large amount of excess foliage and general clean up. Adelaide Plains Council kindly removed the spoil.

PADAG continues to operate and maintain the campground, and reports on Wiki camps by users are most favourable. Occupancy has been down considerably due to the Algy issue. Most users have been from interstate using the facility as a base for local touring or passing through.

The Foreshore Precinct subcommittee has had productive discussions with the Adelaide Plains Council as work proceeds on detailed design

PADAG and the Dublin History Group continue to develop proposals for celebrating the 150th Anniversary of Dublin, Port Parham and Windsor in 2026. A submission has been made to the Adelaide Plains Council to provide funding to support the provision of commemorative markers, time capsules and other activities.

Lock in the Adelaide Cup Weekend, 7-9 March 2026 to be part of these celebrations.

A Christmas Message

I was standing in the back of the church waiting for the service to begin. I was very early having allowed plenty of time to get there on my mobility scooter. I picked up a magazine. The cover

had a close-up portrait of an attractive young woman's head wearing a scarf covering her hair. Another early attendee came up to me and said that we should not allow that magazine on the rack with its Middle Eastern faces on the cover.

I am not the one to immediately have the right retort, but it came to me when I was thinking about writing this Christmas article. "Mary would have looked like that and Joseph too. And the baby Jesus would have been born a Palestinian Jew with brown skin, dark eyes and black hair."

What I am suggesting here is that our white racial prejudice runs deep because we have been brought up, or at least people of my age to think of the world in a racist way. To categorise our fellow humans with white, fair skinned blondes at the top, preferably with an acquired suntan and to have levels of preference with darker skinned humans at the very bottom. All part of God's creation, yet as the line goes down less human by degrees. Such an attitude stems from the nineteenth century racist movement called Eugenics used by the Nazis to justify killing millions of Jews and all people, even whites who were born with some physical or mental impairment.

Scientists tell us that there is no such thing as race at the human level of our DNA, whether from white or coloured, educated or not is the same. I think that if we want to explore why humans are different, we must look to education, opportunity and how we are treated by other humans in authority who have power.

They also tell us that according to our DNA the nearest relatives are chimpanzees who share it by over 98%.

Jesus spent his earthly life trying to teach us that those at the bottom of the heap need to be treated with love. "Love your neighbour as you love yourself." Yes, every committed reader of the bible would agree that the sayings of this little person of colour are the standards by which we live and which we have inherited from our ancestors. We have also inherited much critical prejudice and unthinking negative markers that go along with our Western civilisation.

I could go on about this but I end by asking that we all, myself included take an audit of our lives and review the standards by which we live. Are they guided by strong Christian principles we find in the bible, especially the words of Jesus in the Four Gospels, and what do we have to let go, perhaps some of those attitudes and behaviours in our culture that we have inherited from the past and upon which we unthinkingly base our life principles. I ask you to consider, do we really follow the brown skinned Jesus and his teachings?

Jesus said to his followers, "This is what I say to all who will listen to me. Love your enemies and be good to everyone who hates you. Ask God to bless anyone who curses you and pray for everyone who is cruel to you have pity on others just as your Father God has pity on you." (Luke 6.27-28;36. CEV Bible)

My prayer is that all who read the Dublin Dispatch, their families and friends have a happy and holy and safe Christmas.



END OF AN ERA: Access to Bakers Creek Closed!

Access to Bakers Creek on Gulf St Vincent has been lost after over 150 years since European settlement of the Adelaide Plains.

Significant storms and high tides in May and June of 2025 drove a lot of tidal water into the salt pans behind Bakers Creek, Webb Beach and Port Parham. Some of this water returned to the gulf by creating a new wash out about 100 metres on the north side of Bakers Creek. This washout cannot be crossed safely by motor vehicles, nor can it be avoided by driving around it. Many vehicles have become bogged trying.

The Wash Out

From the earliest of days Bakers Creek has been а recreational area for residents of the Adelaide plains and beyond. Early plans of the Hundred of Dublin show an area north of the creek reserved for recreational purposes.

In the early 1900's

Bakers Creek was accessed by travelling down what is now known as port Parham Road to the foreshore and then south along the beach at low tide to the creek.

A king tide in 1938 resulted in an excessive build up of tidal water in salt pans behind what is now Webb Beach, and this was released by local farmers using dam scoops to create what has become Parham Creek and Webb Creek (originally known as First Creek and Second Creek). Since this cut off access along the foreshore a track was developed via Thid Creek Road and across a salt pan to the sandhills and foreshore approximately 1 Km north of Bakers Creek. This access was always limited by the condition of the salt pan crossing.

When Webb Beach township was developed under the Rural Employment Development Scheme (REDS) in the 1970's a causeway was built across and along the southern side of Webb Creek providing access along what was named Webb Beach Road and George Street to the foreshore. This became the access to Bakers Creek.

The area to the south of Webb Beach is now part of the Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary National Park, and access is controlled by the Department of Environment and Water. The Park management plan allows access to Bakers Creek for recreational purposes.

Concerns are being raised that people are attempting to cross the wash out and becoming bogged, and they seek assistance from residents in Webb Beach for retrieval. This is becoming quite onerous to residents.

Following consultation with residents, The Parham and District Action Group (PADAG) have communicated with Department of Environment and Water seeking the provision of appropriate signage cautioning drivers over the issue. Professional retrieval costs can exceed \$1,000 to recover bogged vehicles.

Historic Dublin Well/Tank Project

The project got off to a slow start late August, but it was a start and showed the difficulties and possibilities.

By October we are now well and truly running with swift progress on the major securing of the corners.

Thank you to the Plains Producer for the article in the 13th October 2025 issue, it is always good to share what is happening in the area. We would also like to thank, Adelaide Plains Council for their support, and Two Wells Landscaping Yard and Adelaide Specialist Coating for supplying the sand and lime that is required to do the work

We had a little dig on the inside of the "TANK" and discovered the floor was present and still intact. This is interesting and leads to numerous possibilities for the future preservation. It also gives an accurate indication of the size and therefore the capacity. There is a watermark still present which indicates a depth of 5 Ft (1.55 meters) at the side, allowing for a dip towards the centre and with a 20 Ft (6.15 metres) width by 20 Ft (6.15 metres) the guestimate of capacity was in the region of a possible 12,500 Gallons (60,000 litres).

Work will continue through the coming months.









When the sides of the tank were cleared we discovered it is a completely different shape than we expected, it has bastions supporting the middle of each side. It keeps surprising us.


